






If you're like me - with a long memory = you probably crin Pge whenever you pull \$5, \$10 or even \$20 from your wallet or purse to buy something and get back very little change. A dollar bill doesn't purchase much these days.

Well, a buck did buy a lot more in the 'good ole days.' Take the late 1940's after wartime rationing ended. A returning World War II veteran lucky enough to find an apartment paid somewhere around \$10.00 a week. That's what my wife, Jeanne and I paid. We lived there four years, and the landlady never raised our rent. An our weekly food bill was about the same amount.

Several Reminisce readers recalled similar bargains:

Whenever you traveled, you could stay at some of the best hotels in the country for \$7. Lois Collier of Vineland, New Jersey, says she and her husband, Jim, spent the first night of their honeymoon in 1946 in the Bellevue Stratfor Hotel in Philadelphia for that modest cost.

That same year, Helen Dalen of Cambridge, Minnesota and her husband, Roger, rented a room at the Radisson Hotel in Minneapolis, "Would you believe our bill was \$6.50, plus 12 cents for a phone call?" she writes. "Still, that was a bit extravagant for us newlyweds."

Helen found the hotel receipt while cleaning out their safe deposit box. For fun, she sent a copy of it to the hotel manager - and was rewarded with a gift certificate for a return one-night stay.

Helen and Roger planned to use the certificate to celebrate their many years of marriage - and at a price that would be even cheaper than the first time.

It's a cinch Helen and Roger wouldn't drive their first car, a 1948 Plymouth special deluxe two-door sedan, to the hotel. "We paid a grand total of \$1,520.60 for it," says Helen.



The Price Was Right for the Times

"The actual price of the car was \$1,416," she explains. "But we added a couple of 'extras' like \$47.50 for a larger heater and defroster, \$17 for a set of seat covers and \$10.45 for a set of wheel rings."

Hosptial Bills in the '40's, unlike today, didn't make you feel sicker than you already were. In 1945, a doctor removed Bob Dingle's tonsils for \$50. "The hospital bill was even less only \$20.70," Bob writes from Kettering, Ohio, "and that included staying a night before the surgery and the night after."

When Joan Rotenberger of Longwood, Florida, had her appendix removed in '49, it probably cost her less than it did her uncle. "I was a waitress in his restaurant in Chestertown, New York, when I had the attack," she explains. "My uncle's dining room was filled with customers. When they saw their waitress being put into an ambulance, they all got up and left, a lot of them without paying for their food.

"They no doubt thought I had polio since it was the era of the polio epidemic."

When Joan left the hospital, her bill totaled \$89.75 for operating room, medicine and lab fees and an eight-day convalescence, after n insurance allowance of \$1.75.

Reminders of old-time prices can turn up in strange places, such as the used bedside table purchased by Jim Honaker's daughter, who lives in Mechanicsville, Maryland.

"In the drawer, she found a 1943 handwritten bill incurred at a place called Wendland's 'Alte Klause" for 13 dinners at \$3 apiece," Jim writes from Arlington, Texas. "It also listed three ice creams at 15 cents each."

In Pensacola, Florida, James Husser was shocked in 1998 when a friend sent him an ad from Colton, California, listing a home for sale at \$115,000. "This was my childhood home from 1938 to 1955. My parents paid \$2,000 for it back then!" he says.

Yep! A dollar bought a lot more just 70 years ago. On the other hand, though a buck was a lot harder to come by. I suppose it's all relative - but it's still fun to look at those old receipts and prices while murmuring, 'Those were the days!'



The Beginning of Inflation

Starting Pay was 25 cents an hour when I went to work at the downtown Shell Oil Service Station in Corvallis, Oregon, in 1941.


I was an 18-year-old high school student, and after a few months experience, I asked for a 10-cent raise. I thought the owner was going to have a heart attack! it was too far along in the summer to get a replacement, though, so after a few days, I got the raise.

The 'service" in service station meant something back then. We wore our own clean white shirts and pants, with a clip-on black bow tie. When a car drove up, a minimum of two attendants came running.

One took the order and ran the gas pump. The other checked the oil, cleaned the front and rear glass and checked their pressure if requested.

The station also offered a wash for \$1. That included vacuuming, steam cleaning the engine and even painting the tires with black tire paint.

I could do four washes a day, plus other jobs like repairing tires. I thought I was worth 35 cents an hour. Don Aker - Manzanita, Oregon



Roy Simpson of Fort Myers, Florida, had just left the Marine Corps and was working for the IRS when he filed his first income tax return. His tax for 1937 was a total of 32 cents! "They took my 32 cents as if it were a common occurrence," Roy reports. "Although I'm now retired, 32 cents didn't even pay the postage on my last return," he adds.

In honor of the 70th anniversary of the 1955 Ford Thunderbird; the car that was designed to compete with Chevrolets Corvette; Jim R. shared some interesting tidbits of history. To come up with a model name Ford held a contest with the prize of a \$250.00 suit. Alden "Gib" Giberson a Ford stylists won the contest for a suit and trousers; that he ended up buying from Sak's Fifth Avenue. Inspired by native American legends from the southwest and a thunderbird on his coffee mug, he suggested the name Thunderbird and designed the Thunderbird logo. In 1951 'Thunderbird Heights' an exclusive neighborhood in Rancho Mirage in the Palm Desert area was being developed.
